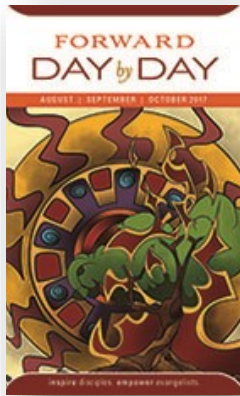
tribution is required to support the publication, *Forward Movement*, in its mission.

Five initiatives were developed from the retreat in January, and various activities have been presented and promoted. Leaders have reported on their individual, specific progress, and indications are that Holy Cross’ “movement” is on track. The congregation is consistently being encouraged to become involved in their special interest and support its mission. Spiritual engagement also plays a significant part in our successes. The overall prevailing theme and aim are to aspire to a Higher calling in service for Him.

Vestry Updates

Holy Cross continues to progress as the year advances, thanks to the work of the many saints in our parish. Here is a summary of recent achievements.

Through the first half of this year, we continued to experience more stability and excitement in the worship experience, spiritual growth and lay leadership, resulting from the work of our new Priest-in-Charge, Rev. Dennis Patterson, together with the vestry and membership. Since Rev. Patterson’s start in January on a very limited basis, several members of the parish have stepped up to sustain the day-to-day operations of the church and there are many signs of vitality at Holy Cross:



- Holy Cross revenues through June, 2017 have run 3.7% above forecast. Church income through June was \$156,551, \$5,500 above forecast.
- Church expenses through June have run 5.3% below our budgeted forecast.
- The Vestry took a leap of faith, and appropriated \$6,000 for the second half of the year to expand our worship experience and to include new and alternative music and liturgy.
- We continue to be current on our financial obligations, including our 2017 Diocesan Assessment and the Diocesan Foundation loan payments.
- The Vestry and membership continue to engage in Let’s Talk sessions where a two-way dialog regarding church progress and plans occurs.
- The five initiatives, begun after the January, 2017 church retreat, have introduced new ways to engage our membership (Casual Sundays, Prayer Conference calls), broadened our spirituality (additional opportunities to pray, plans for a new Adult Sunday School class to begin in September), helped us to greet each other and newcomers (name tags), and worked to strengthen avenues of communication within the church and with the community (Facebook, website updates, etc.). Our Reconciliation Initiative is revving up, and with support from the Diocese, we will define how to move forward. There is more to come in all of these.

There are several activities in motion going forward.

- First, in July, the Vestry voted unanimously to allocate funds to request the Bishop’s approval to amend Reverend Patterson’s contract from one-third part-time to one-half part-time effective immediately, which will allow a more balanced approach to improving our Lay Home Eucharistic Ministry, Lay Leadership development and overall spiritual support. That request was approved by Bishop Wright, and is effective August 1.
- Secondly, there is renewed commitment to establishing a mentoring program for children ages 6 through 12 called the 4E’s (Engage, Empower, Enhance and Explore), led by the Engagement Initiative.
- Thirdly, Holy Cross has begun a new journey with the Diocese in a partnership to support our discipleship experience in the *Circle of Stewardship*.

- Lastly, new focus on the physical plant of the church has surfaced urgent repair needs. The current projection for those repairs is \$31,000, needed in the next 6 - 12 months. We have also identified the need to replace the A/C in the sanctuary, estimated at another \$49,000.00. Our Buildings, Grounds & Equipment Committee, skilled with seasoned architects, engineers and business professionals, guides us on this journey.

For a volunteer army of saints, Ephesians 6:10-20 reminds us to put on His armor, and we have. We understand this journey and we are committed. We continue to pray for the Lord's direction and strength. He's never failed us yet.

We believe that it is through the Lord's providence that Holy Cross has been selected to be one of the sites of an upcoming motion picture production. This venture is exciting and represents another opportunity to expand our Mission and Ministry and especially to share our beautiful campus.

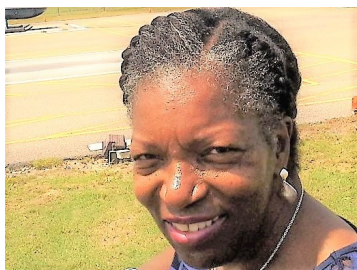
Production activity will occur into mid-October. We will have our Sunday worship services throughout this time period as previously scheduled, and our sanctuary will be untouched. Our nursery will be closed until the filming has ended and the Parish Planning Council has worked diligently to shift dates of other events to ensure that we have what is needed.

While construction and filming are expected to take place Monday through Friday and on some Saturdays, we ask that you minimize your presence on the church grounds during this time. Please contact the church office if and when you feel the need to visit the church office or convene organizational meetings, so we can determine whether we can make it happen and where it would be safe. Thank you for your understanding and patience during this period.

Let's continue to prayerfully move forward. Thanks be to God !!
